It is a dependent clause that does the same job as an adverb or an adverb phrase.</p>

<p>Noun – is a word that names somebody or something.</p> <p>Pronoun – is a word that stands in place of a noun or noun phrase and enable us to avoid repetition</p>	<p>Noun phrase - is a phrase whose head, or chief word, is a noun or a pronoun. It is a string of words that all depend or focus in some way on a single noun. The words may be added before or after the noun.</p>	<p>Noun clause – functions in the same way as a noun</p> <p>Relative clause - gives more information about a noun. You can help children extend their sentences in this way by showing them how to open clauses with which ... who ... whom ... that ...</p>
